

Equity Update since September 2024

OSSTF/FEESO is deeply committed to equity, anti-racism and anti-oppression work so that our Federation, workplaces, and communities are equitable, inclusive, and accessible spaces. The Federation continues to be engaged in several activities as per the Action Plan to Support Equity, Anti-Racism, and Anti-Oppression. A few of the completed and ongoing actions are found below.

- November is Transgender Awareness Month, with November 20, 2024, marking the
 annual observance of Transgender Day of Remembrance. Egale Canada's national
 report, <u>Still in Every Class in Every School</u>, shows that 2SLGBTQIA+ students across
 Canada continue to face homophobia, biphobia, and transphobia at school. A high
 proportion of 2SLGBTQIA+ students also reported feeling unsafe at school. Please visit

- OSSTF/FEESO was proud to participate in the *International Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans, and Intersex Association* (ILGA) World Conference in South Africa. The theme of unity, embodied in the Swahili phrase "Kwa Umoja," meaning "together" or "in unity," was a powerful call for solidarity within movements in times of adversity. This theme was not just a slogan but a guiding principle that inspired and motivated global activists, policymakers, international human rights experts, government, trade unions, representatives, researchers, and journalists who gathered for the facilitated workshops and plenaries. It reminded us that our collective efforts are crucial in tackling pressing issues affecting 2SLGBTQIA+ people worldwide and paving the path toward equal rights for all.
- In October 2024, OSSTF/FEESO invited members to join Harmony Movement as they launched their Words Matter Campaign. The Harmony Movement's Words Matter Campaign aims to reduce harmful and discriminatory language in schools by promoting a culture of respect and inclusivity. The campaign provides schools with tools and resources, including workshops, guides, and best practices, to equip educators, students, and communities with the skills to address and prevent the use of offensive language.
